MASKERS RUN RINGS AROUND THE ABBEY

Mottisfont Abbey is again the setting this week for an open air production by the Maskers Theatre Company, "Ring Round the Moon," by Jean Anouilh, a "piece brillante," that has been drawing large crowds. There have been as many as 300 on some evenings.

The plot is one of those revolving round identical twins, Hugo and Frederick, who are romantically linked to Diana and Isabelle. As this is France of the 1920's, the age of the flapper and the country house party, there is a great deal of room for intrigue. The play is an elegant farce, beautifully written by Anouilh, witty and light as a feather.

On their fourth outing at this splendid venue, the Maskers have plenty of experience, but one important thing they seem not to have realised is that in the open air it takes very strong voices indeed to carry to an audience. The audience is too far away from the actors and actresses, some of whom are indistinct. This is an important fault, since otherwise, Philippa Taylor's production has many delights and is worth seeing. Anyone going this evening or tomorrow should arrive early and get a place near the front.

Brian Stansbridge, in his now accustomed role as leading man, is actually leading men. He plays the parts of Hugo and Frederick, and is able to change, in seconds, from the one brother, shy and timorous, the the other confident and to the other, confident and

Enid Clark and Angela Stansbridge make two very attractive leading ladies. There is no trouble at all about hearing Hazel Burrows, who plays Capulat, faded companion of Madame Desmermortes, Hugo Madame Desine, Hazer and Frederick's aunt. Hazer Madame around in a wheelchair. Her booming voice, in Scottish ac-cent, and bustling walk, her shrieking and hooting mark her out as a character half a step away from the "loony bin" and always entertaining for spectators.

In a strong cast, her performance is matched by Sheila Clark, in a great form as the mother of Isabelle, always opening her mouth and putting her foot in it, and Sonia Morris as Lady India, dancing, intriguing and excessively dramatic in her pronouncements.

On Tuesday evening the play gained added ambiance from the visitation of a balloon in the sky and the production has ended spectacularly each even-ing with a splendid display of fireworks in the gardens of Anouilh's French chateau.

Polished acrobatics

MISTAKEN IDENTITY, trickery and a tangle of love affairs among 1920s high society are the order of this week's open air theatre at Mottisfont Abbey.

Southampton's Maskers Theatre Company is pre-senting a well-worked version of the light-hearted Jean Anoulih play Ring Round The Moon until

Saturday.

Dominating the action is the confusion caused by two brothers with nothing in common apart from their identical outward appearance - and the plot hatched by one to prevent the marriage of the other.

The production's smooth feel despite many quick jumps from scene to scene owes much to the polished acrobatics of Brian Stansbridge in an onerous double role, playing both the scheming dapper Hugo and his bumbling twin and apparent victim Frederick.

Very evident too is the slick timing engineered by director Philippa Taylor on the attractive but very
