


■ What is he up to this time? Bad boy of football, sacked Saint's player Mark Dennis might find there's a new career in store for him — on the stage. For full story see page 3.

We rehearse, build sets and entertain ourselves at Eastpoint, Burgoyne Road, Hightown. All of our activities are open to anyone interested in joining the society.

The Maskers Theatre Company has been performing for 18 years in and around Southampton. Currently we produce 5 shows a year in various different venues. We also appear at cabarets, fétes, Southampton Show, etc. A strong backstage team is also needed to run all these events, so anybody interested in set design and construction, lighting, sound, etc. is very welcome.

Some of our recent major successes have been : 'Lock Up Your Daughters', 'Cyrano de Bergerac', and 'The Dresser'.

Maskers Youth Theatre produce slick Zigger-Zagger

THE performance of Romsey playwright, Peter Terson's play "Zigger Zagger" at the Plaza Theatre in Romsey on Saturday evening was the first production ever for The Maskers Youth Theatre from Southampton. For many of the actors and actresses it was their first appearance on stage; and undoubtedly they brought off a resounding success.

The cast of well over 40, and especially the very young chorus, brought tremendous verve and enthusiasm to their performance, which they maintained to the very end. The age range in the group is from eight years to the early 20s and it says much for them that every single performer was word perfect. The show was very well directed by Tony Lawther, with his wife, Meri Lawther, Miles Spencer, Angela Barks, Ron Tillyer, Clive Weeks. David Allan and Edwin Bescroft as a very efficient back-up team. The slick, unobtrusive action of the props team also contributed considerably to the pace of the production.

The play was written for the National Youth Theatre in 1967 and is a witty story with hidden depths, of football hooliganism, equally relevant in 1987.

Among the many excellent features of The Young Maskers' production, perhaps the most praiseworthy was the superb, maintained characterisation by the lead players and support actors alike.

Great Diversity of Talent

John Carrington as Zigger Zagger, the football addict. showed great diversity of talents; but the star of the show was young Dave McKee, who took the part of Harry Philton with a particularly telling, dry humour, exhibiting a fine feeling for timing and also audience awareness.

Harry's sister, Edna, portrav ed by Debbie Moorhouse, was another example of inspires casting, and Vigie Hobbs Gardner Chalmers, Ganatra and Shauna Lockets

were equally good in their varied role playing.

The show was performed to an almost full house. Pupils from Oaklands School at Lordshill also took part as football fans in the chorus, and obviously enjoyed this successful show, as much as the rest of the cast and the audience.

Vincent, the football hero in the play, adored by all the young fans in the cast, was played at the Plaza by Mr. Dave Edom, Vice-Chairman of Romsey Football Club.



Mark, who is appealing against his dismissal from the First Division side after his much publicised disagreement with manager Chris Nicholl, brought his mum and dad and fouryear-old baby daughter Joanne along to the first night.

"The character is sup-posed to be very hand-some and charming," said Meri Lawther, publicity officer for the Maskers Theatre Company, which stages the play at the Gantry Theatre for a three night run.

"He is very much an idol figure who everybody looks up to.

"The girls have life-size cut-outs of him in their bedrooms, but he tends to use the female fans that flock around him."

Offstage he proves a big hit with the lead charac-ter's girlfriend.

She falls for him when he visits her in hospital after a shot went wide
and hit her in the face!

The play was specially written for the National Youth Theatre in 1967 by Romey playwright Peter Terson, but its story of a would-be football hooligan still stands good today.
