The Story of the Play


Viola is shipwrecked and thrown onto the shores of Illyria. She has lost everything and fears that her twin brother, Sebastian, has drowned. She disguises herself as a man, takes the name "Cesario", and goes to work for the Count Orsino.

Orsino, "a noble duke", is in love with the beautiful Olivia, a Countess, but Olivia is in mourning for her brother and father and will have nothing to do with him. Orsino sends "Cesario" (that is, Viola) to plead his suit. Olivia begins to fall in love with "Cesario" (Viola) who has meanwhile fallen in love with Orsino. Her passion seems hopeless while she is disguised as Cesario ...

Sir Toby Belch, Olivia's uncle, revels in riotous living - largely paid for by Sir Andrew Aguecheek. After a particularly drunken evening, Sir Toby, Sir Andrew, Fabian and Feste the jester are rebuked by Malvolio, Olivia's straightlaced steward. Maria, Olivia's gentlewoman, devises a plan to turn the tables on Malvolio. She writes a letter, imitating her mistress' handwriting, which suggests Olivia loves Malvolio. Malvolio is utterly taken in. He follows the commands in the letter. Olivia thinks he has taken leave of his senses and entrusts him to the care of her uncle. Malvolio is locked up and tormented.

Meanwhile, Sebastian has been rescued by Antonio, and turns up in Illyria. Cesario/Viola and Sebastian look so alike (use your imagination!) that thereafter they are frequently mistaken for one another. Antonio rescues Cesario (Viola) from a duel thinking him to be Sebastian but is then taken prisoner and is horrified when Cesario won't recognise or help him.

Olivia, delighted that she is no longer being cold-shouldered by the man she thinks is Cesario, peremptorily carries Sebastian off to church and marries him. Sebastian can't believe his luck ... Later when Olivia claims Viola/Cesario as her husband, Orsino is furious and Viola desperate and bewildered. Sebastian turns up just in time. The twins are re-united. Malvolio is freed but vengeful. All that remains is for Orsino to realise that the strange attraction he has felt for "Cesario" can easily be converted into love for Viola.



Twelfth Night or What you will

By setting Twelfth Night in the 1930's I have been able to incorporate a lively cafe bar setting with a jazz piano and singer adjoining the street in which we also find Olivia's house and garden.

I wanted the opening scene with Orsino 'If music be the food of love' speech to be lively and vigorous and to see the other activities which could be going on during his speech. Thus Orsino arrives at the end of a song and asks for more. We see Valentine sent off to request an interview with Olivia, and although Orsino is still in retrospective mood, we are aware of Valentine's rejection and subsequent humiliating return with bad news to Orsino.

Throughout the play we catch glimpses of the previous scene or the lead in to another and the interest of the cafe proprietor and his waitress in all the comings and goings!

Mark Ponsford who plays Feste, has written the original music in 1930's style which he performs during the play.

Although I had written music for Clive Butcher's production of Twelfth Night at Romsey, several years ago, it became clear that I would have to rethink completely the musical structures, given the period in which tonight's version is set. Working on the settings has been a most pleasant, if daunting, challenge, and I never expect to serve a more celebrated lyricist!

Acting Shakespeare

Acting Shakespeare is a very rewarding experience. As with any play, you must discover the character - its moods, habits and emotions. There are advantages and disadvantages in playing Shakespeare's characters. On the plus side, there is plenty of research material to delve into. On the down side, the audience will very often have preconceived ideas on every aspect of every character and indeed on how every line should be spoken, so as an actor your interpretation must be credible.

As for delivering words written 400 years ago, obviously some are now obsolete so I found it essential to look up every detail or word I was uncertain of - after all, if the actor is not confident in what he is saying - how will the audience believe it?

This mixture is reflected in the pen-portraits of some of tonight's cast - written by themselves or in some cases by their "friends"?

Michael Antram - Antonio

Following previous appearances in lighter contemporary plays, Michael is now making his debut in both Shakespeare and a straight acting role. By day he teaches Spanish and Theology in a secondary school in Southampton.

Graham Buchanan - Fabian

A founder member who likes to be known as a "mummer of this parish!" Does he ever take anything seriously?

Tony Bull - First Officer

Last seen in "The Devils" here at the Nuffield last January. He has been a Masker for three years and previously appeared in several plays as a member of Studio Players in Salisbury. His next small role is in "Man of Mode" at Winchester Chesil Theatre next month.

Hazel Burrows - Maria

A Masker for 20 years who says, "It's amazing what a little stage make-up can do!" She may be better known to some of you as a local artist, painting flowers on silk.

Robbie Carnegie - Sir Andrew Aguecheek

One of the Maskers' farthest-flung members, living in Chichester, and working there for a firm of legal publishers. For the Maskers, he has appeared in "A Penny for a Song", "Season's Greetings", "The Recruiting Officer", "Amadeus", "The Canterbury Tales" and "A Small Family Business".

Becca Danby - Waitress

The youngest member of the cast. This is her first appearance in a Shakespeare play, even though she has enjoyed previous stage experience in contemporary plays such as "The Evacuees" and "Confusions".

Katrina Dowding - Viola

Working in a male environment is nothing new for Katrina who spends her days on building sites as a Quantity Surveyor. She joined the Maskers in 1992 and has appeared in 'Waltz of the Toreadors', 'A Phoenix too Frequent', 'Joseph Andrews' and 'A Small Family Business'.

David Jupp - Sir Toby Belch

Well known to Maskers and Southampton Operatic Society audiences for his

"large" roles. After playing Sir Toby in Twelfth Night, he takes to the Guildhall stage in March as The Pirate King in SOS's production of Pirates of Penzance.

John Lanasis - Valentine

A singer/songwriter currently engaged in the early stages of writing and recording his debut album. He has previously appeared as Basil in Zorba the Greek. John has only recently returned from living on Corfu in Greece and is married with two small boys.

Sean McCann - Orsino, Duke of Illyria

Knight Errant, practitioner of rakish charm and iambic enthusiast, would like to say hello to his parents, who will answer questions from the audience after the show.

Roger Mallock - Curio

Well travelled Southampton businessman, he is 29, lives at Ocean Village, and not surprisingly has a keen interest in leisure activities! It is his first appearance with Maskers.

Christina Marsh - Waiting woman

This is Christina's first show with the Maskers, having previously performed at Warwick Arts Centre in several minor roles. She keeps fit by teaching 30 five-year olds in a primary school in West End.

Albie Minns - a Priest

Albie became a Masker in 1986, since when he has played numerous character parts. Well remembered for his portrayal of the bookshop manager Frank Doel in "84 Charing Cross Road" and as Bernard the puppeteer in "Seasons Greetings", both at The Plaza, Romsey, his most recent performance at the Nuffield was as Father Barre in "The Devils". Now as Father McGuinness in Twelfth Night - Albie says 'the "Father" the better!'

Jacky Pearce - Waiting woman

New member of the Maskers who has previously played a punk Genie in Aladdin and a robot-cum-spaceman in Jack and the Beanstalk. She considers it's high time she went straight as a serving maid.

Mark Ponsford - Feste

This is Mark's first appearance in a Shakespeare play, and his second principal role with Maskers (the first being Mozart in Amadeus). After five years' work throughout England as actor, M.D., composer, lyricist (including work for D'Oyly Carte's 1992 tour), and performer of eccentric one-man shows, he is now working full-time at the Mayflower Theatre.

Jim Portman - Head waiter

Chairman of JLP Business Machines Ltd, Southampton, this is Jim's first appearance with the Maskers. "Indeed first venture into Amateur Dramatics since his teen ages. At least ten years ago", says Jim!

Ken Spencer - Malvolio

Founder chairman of the Maskers, Ken has been involved in just about every production for the past 25 years. The list of his achievements would need a programme of its own.

Mike Turner - The Sea Captain



Simon qualified as a hospital pharmacist in 1988. He has appeared in several Maskers' productions including most recently, The Canterbury Tales in 1992.
