

Steve Clark - a Masker for fourteen years, Steve was last seen being led to the gallows as John Proctor in RAODS' *The Crucible*. No stranger to on-stage degradation and torture, particularly as Urbain Grandier in *The Devils*, Steve has also appeared as Gary in *Noises Off*, Angel Clare in *Tess*, Gabriel Oak in *Far From The Madding Crowd* and Lopakhin in *The Cherry Orchard*, all of which have thrilled literally several Nuffield theatregoers. Steve is delighted to be working with Maria once again, and says "Thanks to Sue".

Maria Head – has been a member of the Maskers for five years and last appeared at the Nuffield Theatre in *The Cherry Orchard*. In July 2000 she won the David Bartlett Award as best supporting actor for her performance of Lampito as a Glaswegian Spartan in *Lysistrata* at Mottisfont Abbey. Maria attended Avery Hill College in London where Drama was her main subject. Whilst at College she played the part of Martha in *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?* with Norman Pace of 'Hale & Pace'. Other previous major roles include Helene Hanff in *84 Charing Cross Road* and Chelsea in *On Golden Pond*.

STEPHEN KING

Born in 1947, Stephen King was writing prolifically whilst still at High School. By the age of 18 he had already published short stories himself, and *I Was a Teenage Grave Robber* was taken up by Comic Review Magazine. However it was another eight years, when as a \$6,400 p.a. teacher, Stephen sold the rights to his book *Carrie* to New American Library for \$200,000. This was the book that launched his career. It was also the script retrieved by his wife from the rubbish bin when he had lost patience with it.

Many of Stephen King's books have been made into films, including *Carrie, Pet Sematary, The Shawshank Redemption, The Shining* and of course *Misery*. Kathy Bates won an Oscar for the 1990 film *Misery* which also starred James Caan. The stage version was adapted by Simon Moore and first performed in London in 1992 with Sharon Gless (Cagney & Lacey) and Bill Paterson.

Like Paul Sheldon, Stephen King has received many awards. Also like Paul Sheldon he suffered horrific injuries in a hit and run road accident in 1999. Fortunately Stephen is now on the road to recovery having received better care than the character portrayed in *Misery*.
