

### ROS LIDDIARD - Director - HUMBLE BOY

Charlotte Jones was an actress before she became a writer. Frustrated by the actor's lot, which is to wait by the phone for the offer of a starring role, she wrote one for herself! This first play was *Airswimming*, in which she played a woman incarcerated in an asylum, awaiting news of her release. That, says

Charlotte, was a metaphor for Jones-the-actress waiting for her agent to call!

Five years, and several successful plays later, she wrote *Humble Boy*, an elegant tragiccomedy about a mother-son relationship and a study in grief. *Humble Boy* was written with Simon Russell-Beale in mind for the role of Felix, a troubled astrophysicist whose dysfunctional behaviour is at the heart of the play. Luckily, Charlotte's actor husband was appearing with Russell-Beale in *Hamlet* at The Royal National Theatre. The script was handed over...dutifully read...loved by all...and was premiered in The Cottesloe in 2001, with Russell-Beale in the lead role! *Humble Boy* went on to win two *Olivier Awards* and the 2001 Critics' Circle Theatre Award. The play has many themes, one of which is its parallels with *Hamlet*.

The company has enjoyed rehearsing this engaging play, with its beautifully realised characters and we are proud of our association with the Royal Shakespeare Company's innovative Open Stages event. Our involvement with the project encouraged us to integrate other artistic elements in the production. It has been a pleasure to work with Brambridge Park Garden Centre on the *Humble* 's garden, with Ed on the original music, performed live; with Sandra on her clever play, and with speech therapist, Kathy, on Felix's stammer. This production has been both a challenging and really exciting experience.



### FRAN MORLEY - Director - SIX CHARACTERS

Sandra Horn has worked a minor miracle in her ten minute curtain raiser. Six Characters (in search of two authors in this case) is a clever and witty linking of *Hamlet* and *Humble Boy* which has been really enjoyable to bring to life with the company. There are well known *Hamlet* lines and a playful

approach to the characters.

A group of actors have been frozen in time, some of them frustrated with the characters Shakespeare wrote. They are given a kind of Dr Who regeneration into modern actors, who find welcome opportunities in Charlotte Jones' writing to play people they identify with. You don't need to be familiar with *Hamlet* to enjoy *Humble Boy* but making the links is great fun. Six Characters offers a helping hand. Spot the actor who was quite happy with Hamlet as written (and therefore the one most like Hamlet himself), the one who most radically departs from *Hamlet* as we know it, the two who swap places (one of them reluctantly), the one who opts for the quiet life, and the one who does their best to help but maybe with a Rosencrantz and Guildenstern ulterior motive.



### SANDRA HORN - Author - SIX CHARACTERS

I've been writing something or another ever since I can remember, and regularly roped the neighbourhood kids in to take part in my 'shows' when we were all at primary school. To have my play chosen by The Maskers is such heady stuff I still can't quite take it in!



### ROYAL SHAKESPEARE COMPANY - OPEN STAGES

This production is being promoted through the RSC Open Stages project, which aims to re-forge the bond between amateur and professional theatre. In partnership with a number of regional theatres, the RSC are running a national programme of skills-sharing events and showcases, with amateur societies from across the UK invited to produce their own RSC branded Shakespeare-themed productions.
