





Director's Notes

Pygmalion has been great fun to direct, not least in making a few adaptations to suit the open air of Hamptworth. Although many people know the title and have a reasonable idea of the play, it has rapidly become clear to me that many people remember the musical adaptation, *My Fair Lady*, rather better. I hope you will not miss the songs and the Ascot scene too badly! For me, Shaw's observation and caricature of London



society of the time is the great strength of the play, along with his acerbic wit.

When Shaw wrote the play, he wrote it partly in essay form as he explored and expounded his views on the superficiality of London society and his support of the emancipation of women. These essays really helped me to understand and, I hope, portray the tone and messages he wanted to convey. He also finishes with a long explanation of what he imagined would happen to the characters after the end of the play. Our ending is faithful to this and does not adopt the 'Hollywood' ending found in the film, which demanded a romantic and not a pragmatic ending. I haven't been able to resist including the Embassy garden party, however — a scene which Shaw wrote for the film, not the stage.

This is pre-Great War London society at its most shallow and two-dimensional, debunked by Higgins' ability to train Eliza to hoodwink them all simply by adopting their manner of speech and behaviour. However, Eliza shows us reality when she rejects the possibility of merging permanently into that society. For all her inevitable ignorance, she knows and understands so much more than they do and could not live so superficial a life. She is also so much more mature than Higgins, who, despite his years and education, behaves very much like an overgrown infant. He salutes Eliza's emancipation and independence at the end but cannot actually come to terms with it himself. I suspect this may have been the situation of many of the liberal-minded but essentially patriarchal and patronising men of the time who claimed to support the emancipation of women.


I hope you enjoy the show. We have certainly had a lot of fun developing and rehearsing it, challenging our own preconceptions and trying not to burst into song!

G. Bernard Shaw

George Bernard Shaw is well known for his witticisms and one-liners and these abound in this entertaining but also thought-provoking comedy.



"He knows nothing; and he thinks he knows everything. That points clearly to a political career"

Henry Higgins, Professor of linguistics, seeks to impress his new best friend, Colonel Pickering, by vowing that he can pass off a cockney guttersnipe as a 'lady' among high society. Eliza Doolittle just wants to learn to speak well enough to get a job in a flower shop rather than roaming the streets with her basket, which requires, as Higgins says, rather better English than that required for a duchess. They have just six months to achieve this transformation. Higgins quickly finds that it is easier to change speech patterns than language or attitudes.

Bernard Shaw pokes fun at the manners and thinking of pre-First World War society and challenges the unfair dependence of women on men in that society. In the play, there is no physical attraction between Higgins and Eliza, their natural spheres are too distant from one another for that and Higgins never for a moment forgets the flower-girl in the illusion he has created. Others see and accept the new Eliza but for Higgins she will always be a 'squashed cabbage leaf'.

When the play was adapted for film in 1938, Bernard Shaw himself wrote the screenplay and won an Oscar for it. In it he gave way to Hollywood pressure to go for the 'romantic' ending rather than the pragmatic ending he insisted on for the play. Later the play was adapted into a musical, My Fair Lady.

"Hell is full of musical amateurs"

Bernard Shaw was born in Dublin in 1856 but came to London aged just twenty. He was a shy man who created the persona of G.B.S., showman, satirist, controversialist, critic, wit and dramatist to enable him to speak out politically and socially. He wrote 52 plays and died in 1950, remaining physically and mentally active up to his death.

She is currently studying Classics part-time at Reading University alongside pursuing her musical and dramatic interests.



Henry Higgins - Jonathan Barney-Marmont

Jonathan's last show with Maskers was *Metamorphasis* playing Gregor Samsa which could not be more removed from this role. Swiftly after that it was a run at The Mayflower Theatre in *An Inspector Calls*. Jonathan enjoys playing characters at all points of the spectrum and so has enjoyed playing Higgins. He relishes a return to open air theatre after acting in *The 39 Steps* at the Minack Theatre three years ago.



Colonel Pickering - Adam Taussik

Since Adam was the Sarcastic Bystander in Maskers' last production of *Pygmalion* a few years ago, he has been up and down the social spectrum, from servants to kings, ending up as Baloo in *The Jungle Book*. Mrs Higgins - Hazel Burrows

Hazel has been a member of Maskers since the early 70s. Playing wives, maids, old men, fairies, aristocrats even a pig.
