



Director's Notes

If our idea of the story, characters and the place of Lancre isn't quite the same as yours, then the fault lies with the person who agreed to me directing the show. If you see me afterwards I'll give you his number. In all seriousness, though, the responsibility for putting on a Discworld show is huge and the cast and crew have worked tirelessly to bring Wyrd Sisters to life in what we hope is an authentic nod to the world of Pratchett. 

the correct costume, in Great Expectations, and a particularly bolshie

Jo joined us last year for *Great Expectations* and is delighted to find
herself once again married to Eric Petterson and being horrible to SJ
Wareham. While 19th century Kent may seem a long way from Discworld
the clothes are fairly similar so she only packed the one costume. When
she is not spinning through space on the backs of four elephants riding a
giant turtle, Jo works as a freelance commercial copywriter.

Vitoller (an actor-manager) is played by Peter Liddiard

Peter has been a Masker for nearly 30 years, yet this is only the second time he has been bullied (sorry – coaxed!) onto the stage. His main contribution has been in set design – for Maskers at Mottisfont, the Nuffield, and the Studio. He and his wife Ros (Nanny Ogg) also brought their musical nostalgia show, *Thanks for the Memory* to the Maskers Studio. Peter is also heavily involved with the Chesil Theatre.



Mrs Vitoller (his wife) is played by Maria Head

Maria has been a member of Maskers for many years and was last seen in *Antigone* in the studio. She is delighted to be part of the Wyrd Sisters cast and relieved that this time she makes it to the end of the play without dying.

James has been a Masker for over 10 years, portraying a variety of roles including a Mississippi lawyer in *Crimes of The Heart*, a soldier in *Accrington Pals*, one of the Antipholus twins in *Comedy of Errors*, a pirate called Ed in *Treasure Island* and Inspector Fix in *Around The World In 80 Days*. James also directed Ben Elton's *Silly Cow*. He is enjoying getting his teeth into this Pratchett play.



Hwel (a playwright) is played by Hazel Burrows

Hazel was awarded the role of Hwel (pronounced Fwel in Welsh) a part she had not even considered as it is for a man! Always up for a challenge, however, she will now be appearing as half man half woman, with plenty of eye shadow, a beard, and a Welsh accent. Hwel is described as a dwarf but Hazel was not prepared to undertake surgery to fit the part.
