

Director's Notes

It is with the greatest of pleasure I bring this wonderful piece of theatre, with its great one-liners, to life. My cast have worked so hard to explore every page and have not missed a laugh, rather like a piece of music, savouring every note. It will help if you have even a sketchy knowledge of King Lear (see page 6), discovering its many parallels with our play.

The co-writers Ian Hislop and Nick Newman give a nod to everyday trends in our lives, Twitter/Skype and Micro Beers. There are so many recognisable characters. We see, and perhaps know, grumpy Jefferson and assertive Dorothy while they lead the way in attempting to bring a production of *King Lear* to this small village hall, so well supported by its motley crew. It is played in the half round so as to include the audience, as though they were a player waiting for their entrance.

One of the reasons that drew me to directing this play was the brilliant, so very English, humour. I love to laugh, hysterically sometimes, and to leave the theatre feeling well entertained. I saw the staging very simply with two walls providing a huge performance space, heavily dependent on the actors finding their own props. These details help make the characters become believable. Enjoy the wonderful voice of Ruth Kibble as she links some of the scenes with song, Pete Burrows' original music and my tech crew's clever lighting, sound and set. Many thanks also to Ken Hann for his advice with understanding and delivering the bits of the Bard's text that pop up from time to time. I could not imagine a better venue than the Maskers Studio, it's just us!



King Lear - a synopsis. How many famous Lears can you identify?



King Lear revolves around the relationship the King has with his three daughters and his closest advisors. A strong theme is how deceptive words can be, along with the correlation (or lack of it) between wisdom and old age. Feeling his age, Lear has decided to divide his kingdom between his three daughters but requires each

of them to declare her love for him in order to 'earn' her share. Goneril, Duchess of Albany, and Regan, Duchess of Cornwall, both speak enthusiastically and earn their father's praise but Cordelia, the youngest, says nothing because she cannot voice her deep love for him. Lear wants to be loved and admired. Misunderstanding her feelings, Lear disowns and banishes her. He also banishes the Earl



of Kent, one of his oldest friends, for defending Cordelia. Lear's kingdom is shared between Goneril and Regan. Lear plans to

live alternately with each of them. Kent returns later, disguised as a Fool, and wins a place as servant to Lear. Goneril, becomes exasperated by the behaviour of Lear's companions, who are upsetting life at her castle. Lear leaves to go to Regan, who also rejects

him.

Despairing, and deeply regretting rejecting Cordelia, Lear goes mad at the height of a great storm. He and the Fool run wild on the heath, where they meet Poor Tom, a



Tom is actually Edgar, legitimate son and heir of the Duke of Gloucester. He has

taken on this disguise after his jealous, illegitimate brother, Edmund, has falsely claimed he was plotting against their father. Also fooled by lies, Gloucester is trying to keep in with Goneril and Regan while secretly helping the King. They find out and blind him, turning him out onto the heath, where Tom finds him and, maintaining his disguise, helps the old man to accept his fate.

Edmund, meanwhile, has been making up to both sisters and they



have both fallen for him. Goneril poisons
Regan out of jealousy. Edmund leads
Goneril's army against Cordelia, who has
landed with an army to help her father.
There is a touching reunion between
Lear and Cordelia but they are
captured just before Goneril's army is
defeated. Goneril kills herself and

Edgar fatally wounds Edmund. Just before he dies, Edmund admits giving the order for Cordelia to be hanged. They are

too late to save her and Lear's heart breaks as he carries her body and he dies. Edgar is left to re-organise the kingdom and resolve the civil wars.
